




LA traffic was heavy even back in 1955. This shot is the 101 Freeway near the Arroyo Seco / Harbor Freeway interchange.




The Hughes H-4 Hercules "Spruce Goose" docked at Long Beach. At 400,000 pounds, it was the largest flying boat ever built.




Philippe The Original, Chinatown, Los Angeles. Birthplace of the French Dip sandwich. Operating at this Alameda St. location since 1951.




A DC-3 parked on the runway at Grand Central Air Terminal in 1940. The building still stands—right across the street from Glenair's corporate headquarters.






Disneyland—The Happiest Place on Earth—still under construction in 1955 in this aerial shot.
